## HEAD COACH - WILLI STEINROTTER



Entering his 18th year as Clarkson University's men's soccer coach, Willi Steinrotter has established Clarkson as one of the most respected Division III programs in the region. During his tenure, Steinrotter has guided the Golden Knights into postseason play six times, including berths in the NCAA Tournament in 1993 and 1998.

Steinrotter, who served as an assistant coach for the Knights in 1989, is the sixth head coach at Clarkson since the program began in 1953.

A native of Sodus, New York, he boasts one of the best winning percentages among Clarkson's soccer coaches, and surpassed the 100-career victory mark in 2001 when the Knights posted a 10-5-1 record. More impressively, Steinrotter became the school's all-time winningest soccer coach in 2004 when he earned his 118th career victory in the final game of the season. Steinrotter has guided the Green and Gold to a 123-138-21 overall record since 1990 and numerous Knights have earned all-star recognition under Steinrotter's tutelage, including Larry Martin '92 and Michael Krimse '94, who gained All-America status. Kirmse also became a member of the

Clarkson Athletic Hall of Fame in 2005,

In his first three years as head coach, the Knights participated in consecutive ECAC playoffs. Selected as NSCAA Northeast Regional and EAA Coach of the Year in 1993, Steinrotter guided the Green and Gold to their best season ever that fall. Clarkson posted a 13-4-2 overall record, won its first league title ever with a 6-0 conference mark, and advanced all the way to the semifinal round of the NCAA Tournament.

In 1998, Steinrotter guided Clarkson to one of its finest seasons ever with a 12-5-2 record and advanced to the championship game of the NCAA East Regional. The Knights earned a 13th place ranking in the final National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) Poll.

A 1989 graduate of Hobart College, Steinrotter possesses a very impressive soccer background. The son of long-time Hobart soccer coach Willi Steinrotter Sr., he was an all-star, three-sport athlete for the Statesmen from 1985-1989. As a striker on the Hobart soccer team, he was named ICAC Co-Rookie of the Year in 1985, and also earned numerous ICAC and NYS All-Star team honors.

Steinrotter makes his home in Potsdam with his wife, Jamie, and their newborn daughter, Emmie.



Hugo Fernandez-Davila is entering his first season as the assistant coach of the Clarkson University Men's Soccer team. He spent the past two seasons as a midfielder at Liberty League rival Union College, where he produced five goals and two assists for 12 points in 39 games played, leading the Dutchmen to a 26-10-4 record with an NCAA appearance in 2005. Prior to playing at Union, the Lima, Peru native spent two seasons at Division I Siena College, participating in 25 games in his freshman and sophomore seasons before transferring. A 2007 graduate with a double-major in Political Science and Latin American Studies, Fernandez-Davila was a three-time All-Academic performer for Siena and Union. He will continue his education as a graduate student at Clarkson.

## CLARKSON READIES FOR RETURN TO LIBERTY LEAGUE TOURNAMENT

The last five seasons for the **Clarkson University Men's Soccer** team have produced less than desirable results with only 15 wins in 80 games. However, the proud program run by long time head coach **Willi Steinrotter** is unwilling to accept such doldrums any longer and the staff and team are expected to turn the corner and return to the **Liberty League** playoffs in 2007.

Steinrotter, along with assistant coaches **Hugo Fernandez-Davila** and **Ken Rushing**, have already seen positive notions in the early going, including an impressive run over the course of four games in seven days in Germany during mid-August. There are a lot of positives coming back from last season. Seventy-one percent of the team's goal-scoring punch returns to the 2007 lineup and the freshman class is one of the most talented groups to come along in the past decade.

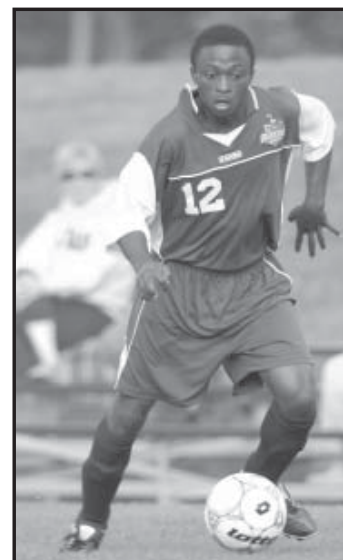
Senior striker **Seni Makinde** (Hyde Park, MA), who earned a Liberty League All-Star nod in 2007, was a revelation late in the 2006 season and has continued his progression in the collegiate ranks, scoring four goals in the first three games of the Germany trip. Senior **Andrew Cahill** (Rome, NY) and juniors **Scott Marcinkowski** (Wappinger Falls, NY) and **Kevin Martens** (Salt Point, NY) also each contributed a goal for the attack last season, with Martens assisting on two more goals for four points.

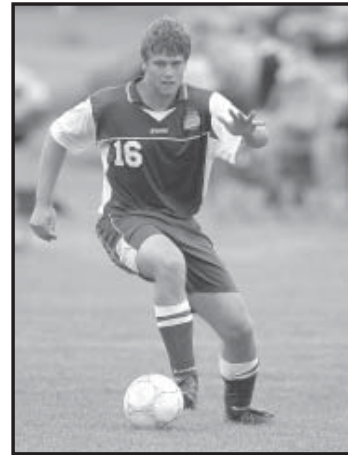
The attack should be led by the upperclassmen, but it would certainly not be out of the question for a gifted newcomer to step in and remove some of the scoring load from the shoulders of the veterans. Freshman **Scott Desmond** (Enfield, CT) should see regular playing time with a shot at starting while sophomores **Drew Bonner** (Killington, VT) and **John Birchenough** (Lowville, NY) look to emerge from the training squad to fill regular roles as well. Freshman **Francis Dayamba** (Albany, NY) was also a late addition to the roster as a walk-on and will likely see time later in the season once he becomes acclimated to the college game.

While the forwards seem skilled and prepared to launch a prodigious offensive attack, the midfielders also possess excellent depth and experience. Senior midfielders **David Jette** (Swanton, VT) and **Michael D'Amico** (Fairport, NY) were two of three players to compete in every game during the 2006 campaign, and the pair provided a steadying, consistent influence in the midfield. Juniors **Scott Markgraf** (St. James, NY) and **Jimmy Foster** (Chittenango, NY) proved valuable off the bench

and classmate Cale Samuel (Mississauga, ONT) was the most versatile player on the team for the Knights, logging time on defense, in the midfield, and as a striker. Sophomores **Phil Boyd** (Groveland, MA), **Matias Pena** (Port Washington, NY) and **Stefan Vergura** (Waitsfield, VT) saw regular time for the Knights with each playing in at least 11 games with a start or more. The team is also pleased to see the return of **Joey Eisenhauer** (North Chili, NY), who took a year off, to the field. His leadership and talent should only provide more depth to an already solid group of veterans.

The list of freshmen in the midfield is a short one considering the depth of the veterans, but the pair of newcomers has coach Steinrotter excited about the future. **Andrew Ensinger** (Rochester, NY) will have Clarkson soccer aficionados recalling the days of past all-stars Jon Banz and Mike Secko, while **Chris Bates** (Schenectady, NY) will also challenge for regular playing time. Freshman **Alexander Winiarski** (Wappingers Falls, NY) will start the season on the training squad, but looks to jump into the lineup later in the campaign.

The backs are a fairly young and inexperienced group, but the level of talent on defense easily matches the Golden Knights' quality anywhere else on the field. Senior **Nick Kulp** (Brockport, NY) starts the season injured, but when he returns his three seasons of experience will provide plenty of tutelage for the youngsters, as will classmate's **Scott McDonough** (East Aurora, NY). Sophomore **Brody Boomer** (Louisville, KY) turned in a performance worthy of rookie of the year consideration as a freshman last season as he finished as the team's third-leading scorer in 2006. With a year of collegiate play under his belt, he should see even greater accomplishments in his second season.

The freshmen defenders will be an imperative part of the team's success as the Golden Knights look to dramatically reduce their goals allowed in 2007. Newcomers **Brett Laudermilch** (Lebanon, PA), **Kyle List** (East Falmouth, MA), **Justin White** (Dewitt, NY) and **Jeremy Toscano** (Brockport, NY) are as good of a group of rookie backs in the conference and will be depended upon early in their careers.

Four different goalkeepers saw time in net last season, something that coach Steinrotter hopes will change in 2007. The team possesses three capable keepers in senior **Johnathon Rushing** (Paw Paw, MI), junior **Mike St. Croix** (Watertown, NY) and sophomore **Mike Davis** (Otego, NY). Rushing spent more time in goal than anyone, logging 582 minutes to make 47 saves with a 2.78 goals against average. St. Croix came in for action on five occasions and played 380 minutes, making 35 saves. His .778 save percentage and 2.37 goals against average were the best among the three regulars.



Also looking to earn time is Davis, who participated as a defender in his freshman season. He is the most intimidating figure among the three goalies, standing 6-3 and weighing close to 200 pounds. His reach and size should make it difficult for opponents to get the ball past his outstretched grasp.

## TRADITION

A single match in 1953 began the soccer varsity history at Clarkson University, a solitary 1-0 win over Oswego State. Since that lonely schedule was completed more than 50 seasons ago, the **Golden Knights** soccer program has grown into a powerhouse in the northeast, full with four NCAA appearances, a trip to the NCAA Final Four in 1993, and numerous All-America status.

The program began in 1953 under coach **Jack Hantz**, an inaugural **Clarkson Athletic Hall of Fame** inductee. Hantz guided the team from 1953 to 1967, amassing a record of 55-60-5. While Hantz's teams didn't enjoy the success of the later installments of Clarkson soccer, he built the groundwork for teams that would make Division III history. In the early days of Golden Knights' soccer, the teams could produce goals with some of the better teams in the country, evidenced by All-New York State selection **Bruno Lewandowski**, who scored 35 goals in only 23 career games from 1956 to 1958. Lewandowski and **Paul Martin** were the first players to earn All-NYS honors in 1958, but the pair would certainly not be the last. Near the tail end of the coaching career of Jack Hantz, several players emerged to push the team into further prominence.

**Kwasi Poku**, a student-athlete from Ghana, walked on to the team back in 1965 and quickly established himself as one of the top players in Division III, gaining All-America status in 1968. Poku finished with 92 career points in just 45 games and attained All-ICAC honors three times. He would be the first of seven Clarkson soccer All-Americans.

Immediately after Poku's graduation, a new group of standouts came on to lead the Knights, including **Rick Cianciotto**, a two-time ICAC all-star, and midfielder **Cade Lockwood**, who earned all-league honors all four years of his career. Through the mid-1970s, the team hovered around the .500 mark, but the arrival of a talented corps of players in the late-1970s turned the tides for the soccer program. In the four-year stretch from 1979-82, the Knights went 38-20-4 to break out of their rut, including the team's first NCAA appearance in 1980. **Mark Bissonette** surpassed Poku's scoring records in 1980 when he approached 100 career points with 37 goals and 21 assists, earning All-America Honorable Mention honors in both his junior and senior seasons. Bissonette's graduation did not lead the team void of an All-America contender, however, as **Ali Ouarzeddini**, **Vele Galovski** and **Tim MacCarrick** each were named All-America once in the following three seasons. The period marked a change in Clarkson's style of play as both Galovski and MacCarrick earned their honors as goalkeepers. Galovski recorded 28 shutouts in 61 games from 1979-82 and MacCarrick followed in his footsteps with 19 shutouts in 62 games over the following four seasons. With successful goalkeepers to anchor the defense, coach **Brian Chafin**'s team reached the post-season five times in a nine-year span from 1980-1988, including a pair of NCAA appearances. The Knights blew away the competition during the season of their second NCAA appearance in 1988, going 14-1-2.

After a one-year transition period when Chafin moved on from his coaching duties at Clarkson, current coach **Willi Steinrotter** entered the fold and continued the program's run of post-season appearances. In his first four seasons at the helm, Steinrotter led

the team to three straight ECAC appearances and finally an NCAA showing in 1993. Clarkson could still defend in the backfield, but the team became an offensive powerhouse under Steinrotter's tutelage. **Larry Martin** earned All-America honors his senior season and became the team's all-time leading scorer with 45 goals and 11 assists for 101 points when he surpassed **Dan Gasbarre**, who had established a new scoring mark of 97 points from 1984-87. Amazingly, six of Clarkson's top 18 scorers played at some point during the 1990-93 period as the Knights scored 156 goals in 71 games. The high-octane Golden Knights ran through the 1993 season with an unblemished record in conference, but really got hot at the right time of the season and danced through the NAACAs all the way to the Final Four. Senior All-America **Michael Kirmse**, who would later play at a number of levels of professional soccer, tied a single-season school record in 1993 with 16 goals and set another mark with 42 points. While the scoring records were impressive, Kirmse's play in the post-season caught the most attention. In the NCAA Northeast Regional, he tallied a goal in the regional semifinal win against Plattsburgh and scored the winning goal in Clarkson's 2-0 victory over Cortland in the regional finals. In the following contest, Kirmse provided the dramatics in the Knights' third straight NCAA win with a goal against Rowan at the 51:17 mark in the quarterfinal round of the 1993 NCAA Tournament, held at Snell Field in mid-November, the only score of the contest. The Knights finished with a record of 13-4-2 that season.

A fall off was expected with Kirmse's graduation, but the Knights quickly retooled and made runs at the NCAA Tournament in three of the next five seasons, including a berth in 1998. Once of the most talented teams in the history of the program, the Golden Knights offensive weapons were so spread out that opponents never knew who to mark up, leading to a school-record 50 goals. Eight different players earned all-league honors, led by All-NYS selections **Matt Nachman**, **Michael Secko** and **Stan Brener**. The team has continued to earn numerous victories over

the past few seasons, but also has come through with strong academic achievements. Recent graduates **Oliver Koehler '95**, **Matt St. Onge '96**, **Matt Nachman '99** and **Michael Secko '00** are several Knights who have gained CoSIDA Academic All-America honors. Three members of the Clarkson soccer program have been enshrined in the University's Athletic Hall of Fame. **Al Graham**, one of the pioneers of Clarkson soccer, gained Golden Knight immortal status in 1992 as an inaugural selection while Poku and Kirmse each gained admittance to the select group in 2005.

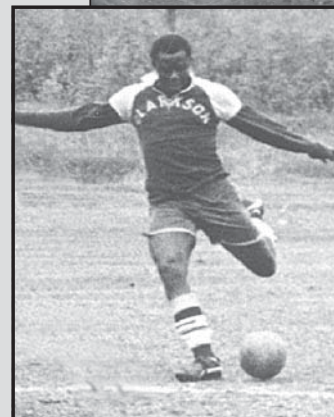

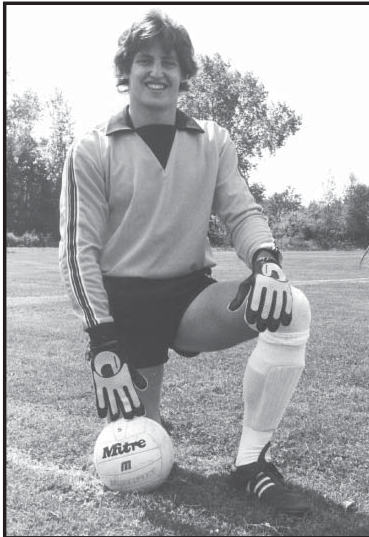

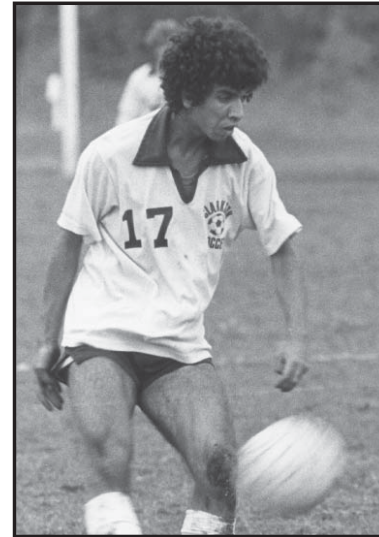
