HEAD COACH CHRIS BATES



Ninth Season | Dartmouth '90

Chris Bates is now in his ninth year as head coach of the Drexel men's lacrosse team. Since taking over as head coach in 2000, Bates has built the Dragons into an annual contender for a playoff spot in the highly competitive Colonial Athletic Association. This past year, Bates and the Drexel lacrosse program received national recognition after completing one of the best seasons in school history.

The 2007 season produced numerous firsts for the program. It all started in February, when Bates' team shocked the lacrosse world by scoring two goals in the final 10 seconds to defeat top-ranked Virginia in Charlottesville, 11-10. It was the first time in school history that Drexel had defeated the number one team in the nation in any sport. With that win, the Dragons appeared in the top 20 poll for the first time since Bates took over the program. They ended the regular season ranked 17th in the nation with an 11-5 record and, for the first time since joining the CAA, earned a share of the league's regular-season title. The 11 wins tied for the second highest total ever at Drexel and the team defeated three nationally ranked opponents for the first time. The 2007 season came to an end at home in front of a capacity crowd at Vidas Field in the CAA semifinals, the first home playoff game for the Dragons in the last 25 years.

While the Dragons came up just short in their ultimate goal of making the NCAA Tournament, they did receive a number of accolades. Bates was named the CAA Coach of the Year after leading the team to a share of the CAA title. The Dragons were picked fifth in the preseason poll. In addition, Bates had four of his players named First Team All-Conference and had both the Defensive Player

of the Year and the Rookie of the Year. Drexel's Adam Crystal became the Dragons' first All-America selection since 1978.

In 2005, Drexel finished the year with a 9-5 record. It was the second time in Bates' tenure that the Dragons had won at least nine games. They finished tied for 14th in the nation in win percentage. Three of his players were named Second Team All-CAA by the league's coaches. In addition, Bates' team was fifth in the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 7.14 goals per game and finished eighth in man-down defense.

Bates and his team narrowly missed out on their second-straight berth in the Colonial Athletic Association tournament in 2004. The Dragons lost a number of close games, including four one-goal games. Two of those one-goal games came against conference foes Hofstra and Sacred Heart.

In 2003, Bates and his staff rebounded from a difficult start to reach the CAA Tournament for the first time. Drexel won five of its final six regular-season games to qualify for postseason play. The Dragons finished the season with a 6-8 record, with six of those losses coming to teams that played in the 2003 NCAA Tournament.

Since taking over the head coaching duties, Bates has turned the lacrosse program around. In 2002, Bates led the Dragons to a 9-5 record and a 3-2 mark in the team's first season in the powerful Colonial Athletic Association. The nine wins tied the 1973 team for the fifth-best win total in the 56-year history of lacrosse at the school. The Dragons closed the season by winning seven of their last nine contests.

Bates took over as the fifth head coach in the school's history in May of 1999. He served as an assistant for five seasons before taking the head job. Bates also started the lacrosse program at Archbishop Ryan in 1992, where he is a member of the school's Lacrosse Hall of Fame.

During his undergraduate days, Bates was a standout on attack and midfield at Dartmouth College. He was a four-year starter and was named All-Ivy League and All-New England in both 1989 and 1990. He appeared in the North-South All-Star Game as a senior. Bates graduated with a bachelor's degree in psychology in 1990. He received his master's degree in education (school psychology) from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1998.

Following his playing career at Dartmouth, Bates played professionally for eight seasons in the Major Indoor Lacrosse League (MILL). He played for seven years with the Philadelphia Wings and one season with the Charlotte Cobras. Bates was a member of three championship teams in Philadelphia during the 1994, 1995 and 1998 seasons. During the 1996 season, his only season in Charlotte, Bates was named All-Pro. He has also played club lacrosse for the New York Athletic Club and the MAB Paints/Philadelphia Lacrosse Club, where he was named All-Club after the 2001 season.

Bates is a native of Katonah, N.Y and was recently inducted into the Hudson Valley Lacrosse Hall of Fame. He currently lives in Wallingford, Pa., with his wife, Ann, and his son, Nicholas.

Andrew Baxter Fifth Season Springfield '01

Andrew Baxter is now in his fifth season with the Drexel lacrosse program. It is his fourth year as Coach Bates' top assistant. Baxter's main duties include on-field coaching, recruiting and scouting.

Baxter handles the team's defense, and works with the face-off specialists and the man-up unit. His units had an exceptional year in 2007. The defense finished in the top 10 in the nation, allowing just 7.5 goals per game. The face-off unit was 11th in all of Division I. It was the second time in the last four year that Drexel was ranked in the top 15th nationally in face-off percentage.

Baxter came to Drexel after spending two years as an assistant coach under Jim Nagle at Colgate University. Prior to his arrival at Colgate, Baxter was a midfielder at Springfield on a team that was ranked as high as third in the nation in Division III and advanced to the NCAA Tournament in each of his two seasons. Baxter transferred to Springfield from Potsdam and graduated from Springfield in 2001 with a degree in physical education.

The native of Rochester, N.Y., graduated from Brighton High School. He currently resides in Philadelphia. Baxter is in Drexel's master's degree program, where he is working toward an advanced degree in public communications.

Assistant Coach



Stephen Brundage First Season Loyola (Md.) '05

Stephen Brundage is the newest member of the Drexel lacrosse staff. Brundage joined the staff in July and will work primarily with the offense and will assist with scouting and recruiting.

Brundage had a stellar career at Loyola (Md.) in Baltimore. He was a two-time All-American and started every game during his four seasons at the school. Brundage finished with 88 goals and 143 points in his career. He was a two-time team MVP and served as a captain during his senior year. Brundage led the Greyhounds in scoring three times and played in the North-South All-Star Game after his senior year.

Brundage, who graduated in 2005 with a degree in marketing, was drafted by the Chicago Machine of Major League Lacrosse. He started 10 of the last 12 games and was fourth on the team in scoring. Brundage also coached for one season at Loyola.

He attended West Genesee High School in Syracuse, N.Y., where he was named All-State three times and was a High School All-America as a senior. Brundage led the team to a pair of state title games and one state championship. He is the second all-time leading scorer at West Genesee.

2008 SEASON OUTLOOK

The Drexel men's lacrosse team had one of the best seasons in school history in 2007 and is looking to take it a step further in 2008. The Dragons won 11 games, including a victory against top-ranked Virginia on the road, and a share of the Colonial Athletic Association regular-season title. The team was ranked as high as 15th in the nation and finished the year in the top 20 for the first time in school history. The Dragons return all but two starters from a year ago as they look to continue the success they achieved in 2007.

Attack

Drexel had a solid season from its attackman in 2007 and return all three starters from the unit. Junior Andrew Chapman made an immediate impact in his first season at Drexel. Chapman led the CAA in both goals and points. He finished eighth in the country in goals per game and his 42 goals were the most for a Drexel player in 14 years. He is joined up front by sophomore Colin Ambler, the CAA's Rookie of the Year in 2007. Ambler finished fourth in the CAA in goals per game and seventh in scoring. He had 22 goals and 13 assists in 14 games before being injured. Also returning on attack is Ron Garling. The junior scored 18 goals a year ago including five against Albany. His production should continue to increase.

Sophomore Joe Variano saw significant action down the stretch last season. He had seven goals and a pair of assists. Fellow sophomore Bryan Brodzik saw the field in limited duty in his first season.

Midfield

The Drexel midfield could be one of the deepest positions on the team by the time the season starts in the spring. Junior Jon Van Houten had another solid year and is emerging as one of the top middies in the CAA. Van Houten scored 14 goals and led the Dragons with 14 assists last year. Sophomore Greg Casey had an impressive rookie year. The Glenside, Pa. native had seven goals and eight assists in his first season with the club.

A number of players will be in the mix to join Casey and Van Houten on the first midfield line. Seniors L.C. Moerschel and Mike McTernan are veteran players who have the most experience in the group. Both players had a pair of goals in 11 games a year ago. They will be counted on to become leaders at the position in 2008. Junior Brian Neary saw a good deal of action as a defensive middle, but could see more time on the offensive side of the field this season. Neary contributed five goals and an assist as a

sophomore. Sophomore Dan Layfield came on as the year progressed and chipped in with a pair of goals as a second line middle in his first year. Senior Peter King and junior Joe Wojciechowski and could battle for a spot on the second or third line this fall.

Kevin Dart had a good season as a sophomore short-stick middle. He has the ability to change the game with his athleticism and can create in transition. Sophomore Dennis Murray should play more of a role this year at short stick. Murray appeared in nine games as a freshman but will be counted on more this spring. Junior Mike Avato is back for his third year. A versatile player, he could see time either at the short stick or switch to the long pole. Sophomore Nick Kusturiss add depth to the defensive midfield position.

Defense

Drexel's defense held opponents to just 7.5 goals per game last season, which was the eighth lowest total in the country. Most of the defense is back in 2008. The one starter missing is Adam Crystal, who last year became Drexel's first All-America selection since 1978. He will be difficult to replace, but the coaching staff feels it has the depth to help negate the loss of Crystal, who was the CAA's Defensive Player of the Year. First-year players Brian

2008 SEASON OUTLOOK



McWilliams and Matt McCormick performed well a year ago and will be asked to step up their play in 2008. McWilliams, a senior, and McCormick, a sophomore, each started all 16 games in their first seasons in University City. McCormick was named to the CAA's All-Rookie Team.

Junior Matt Munoz is a capable reserves on defense for the Dragons. Redshirt freshman Christopher Rotante round out the squad and could compete for time on defense.

At the long pole, Drexel once again returns Steve Grossi. The senior was a First Team All-CAA pick last year after being named a Preseason All-America by Inside Lacrosse. A Second Team All-CAA pick in each of his first two seasons, Grossi is a fiery leader who has the ability to change the game and get the team into transition offense. A leader of the defense, Grossi is now in his second year as a co-captain of the team. Junior Brendan Baker will be on the field even more in 2008. He played in all 16 games as a sophomore and has a chance to be a solid player in the CAA. Sophomore Beau Issleib and junior Danny Fessel each saw some action a year ago the position.

Specialists

The Drexel special teams had another strong season last year, and Drexel Head Coach Bates has most of the key players from those units back for 2007. The man-down unit was fourth in the nation with a success rate of .796. Grossi, McWilliams, McCormick, Neary and Baker are all returning to that unit. Last season was the second straight year the man-down unit finished in the top 10 nationally.

The Dragons' face-off unit was 11th in Division I last year, winning just under 58 percent of its draws. While the Dragons will have to go on without the graduating Mike Filippone, who had more than 360 face-off wins in his career, the cupboard is not empty. Sophomores Zak Fisher and Nick Kusturiss made immediate contributions last year and will be counted on to do even more in 2007. Fisher, a member of the CAA's All-Rookie Team, finished ninth in the nation last year, winning just under 61 percent of his face-offs (92-151). Kusturiss had a .723 percentage in limited time, winning 34 of his 47 attempts. Ryan West, who redshirted last year, is also a capable performer at the "x". This could be one of the strengths of the 2007 team.

Goal

The Drexel goalkeepers were a key to the team's success in 2007. For the second straight season, Bruce Bickford started every game in the cage. He has become one of the top goalkeepers in the nation and was a big reason Drexel finished in the top 10 nationally in scoring defense. Last year, Bickford finished eighth in the country in goals against average at 7.37 and was ninth in all of Division I with a .590 save percentage. Bickford turned away at least 10 shots in 10 of the Dragons' games in 2007. He had perhaps the finest game of his career in the season-opener against Virginia. Bickford made a season-high 18 saves in the Dragons' upset of the top-ranked team in the country. Sophomore Andy Blahut, who redshirted last year, is back and should serve as the team's primary back-up to Bickford in the cage.

Schedule

Drexel opens the 2007 season with a home contest against perennial-power Virginia. The Cavaliers will be one of five teams on the Dragons' schedule that made the NCAA Tournament in 2006. Drexel will play road games at Notre Dame and Albany this year. The Dragons will also play Penn at Franklin Field. It will be the first meeting between the University City rivals since 1994.

VIDAS ATHLETIC COMPLEX

Renovations to Drexel's athletics fields were completed in 2006. The field complex at 43rd and Powelton Ave. now boasts a synthetic Sprinturf field, and an Astroturf field in addition to resurfaced tennis courts and a newly renovated softball field.

Drexel athletes compete on state-of-the-art fields equipped with exterior lighting. This allows teams to play night games and have morning and evening practices to better accommodate the schedules of student-athletes. Thanks to the efforts of alums Robert Buckley ('58) and Vince Vidas (B.S. '59, M.S. '64), whose fund-raising and support enabled these improvements, Drexel's field complex is now one of the best outdoor collegiate athletics venues in Philadelphia.



Vidas Field

The lower field, which bears the name of Drexel legend Vince Vidas, was converted from a natural grass field in 2005. Vidas Field plays host to all home men's and women's soccer and lacrosse competitions. The field has already played host to the Drexel Invitational Soccer tournament, the 2007 CAA Men's Lacrosse Semifinals and it served as a practice site for the 2006 NCAA Men's Lacrosse Final Four.

Buckley Field

Drexel's field hockey team plays on the new Astroturf field located on the North side of the Vidas Athletic Complex.

The field also features a new scoreboard, as well as bleachers, which can seat up to 500 spectators. In addition to game day activities, Buckley Field is often used as a venue for field hockey and lacrosse clinics. The field also played host exhibition matches against the British National Men's Lacrosse Team and the British National Women's Field Hockey Team.

Jack Buckley Hoogstraten Sports Medicine Center

The latest additions to the field house complex are the Jack Buckley Hoogstraten Sports Medicine Center and the renovation of both the men's lacrosse locker room and coaches' offices. The center allows Drexel's sports medicine staff to provide student-athletes with immediate medical attention and treatment at the athletics field complex.



Kopp Lounge

In addition to the top-of-the-line sports medicine center and locker room facilities, Drexel's field house also houses the Kopp Lounge. The lounge is a unique venue where today's fans gather to support their Drexel teams while paying homage to some of the program's all-time greats. A mural depicting Drexel's history of success in field sports adorns the east wall of the lounge. The east side of the room opens to a patio overlooking Vidas Field. The Kopp Lounge plays host to alumni gatherings, post-game celebrations and fan rallies.

THE DASKALAKIS ATHLETIC CENTER

The John A. Daskalakis Athletic Center houses Drexel's intramural and intercollegiate athletic programs. The DAC opened in February of 1975 and covers a three-acre area on the north side of Market Street between 33rd and 34th streets in the University City section of Philadelphia. The facility includes a collegiate-sized, six-lane swimming pool and a separate three-board diving well on the lower level. The Independence Blue Cross Wellness Center houses exercise rooms, Nautilus, free-weight and cardiovascular training areas, a multi-purpose classroom, a dance studio and a conference room on the lower level of the building.

The DAC Sports Medicine Center

The Sports Medicine Department of Drexel University Department of Athletics provides high quality medical care to all student-athletes participating in Drexel Intercollegiate Athletics. Head Athletic Trainer Michael Westerfer is in his fourth full season overseeing Drexel's training staff. Westerfer completed his bachelor's degree in physical education at Temple University then earned his master's degree in exercise science from the University of Massachusetts in 1996. Prior to his arrival at Drexel, Westerfer served as the assistant athletic trainer at Temple where he coordinated all phases of health care for five athletic teams. He is a member of the National Athletic Trainers Association and is a Pennsylvania Athletic Training Licensure.

Drexel's Sports Medicine Center at the Daskalakis Athletic Center is staffed by an experienced sports medicine team that provides the student-athletes with a vast amount of medical services, ranging from injury prevention and treatment of athletic injuries to post-surgical rehabilitation. The athletic training staff consists of four full-time certified athletic trainers and a graduate assistant athletic trainer. In addition to the athletic trainers, the sports medicine team consists of two team physicians, an orthopedic surgeon and a primary care physician, and a physical therapist in order to ensure that the student-athletes have the best medical care possible. The team physicians serve in a daily consultant role and are available on-campus to evaluate and treat student athletes in a private examination office in the DAC athletic training room on a weekly basis. The department's physical therapist facilitates the student-athletes' rehabilitation from major injuries and is available on-campus to evaluate and treat student athletes in the DAC Sports Medicine Center. This facility includes dedicated treatment, taping, and hydrotherapy, rehabilitation, office space and doctor's examination room areas equipped with state of the art modalities and equipment.



The Walter Spiro Varsity Weight Room

The Walter Spiro Varsity Weight Room, which opened in March 1997, serves as the strength-training epicenter for all Drexel University student-athletes. Head Strength and Conditioning Coach Michael Rankin oversees a staff of certified strength and conditioning coaches who oversee the physical development of all 16 varsity teams. Rankin graduated from West Chester University with a degree in kinesiology and education with a minor in coaching. Rankin, who is in his fifth season at Drexel, is recognized as a Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist and a Certified Personal Trainer through the National Strength and Conditioning Association. Last season, Rankin was selected by a panel of his peers as one of two finalists for the National Strength and Conditioning Association College (NSCA) Strength and Conditioning Professional of the Year Award.

The Strength and Conditioning Program at Drexel University is dedicated to pursuing excellence. A variety of techniques are incorporated and designed to help our student-athletes improve speed, agility, power, endurance and flexibility. This is achieved through the implementation of current and sound research in the field of strength and conditioning. The strength and conditioning program offers student-athletes an environment in which to excel both as individuals and team members. Recent upgrades to the weight room provide student-athletes with a variety of state-of-the-art strength training machines and free-weight equipment. The room also features hammer strength machines and four lifting platforms for performing explosive Olympic-style lifts. In all, over 35 work stations are available for performance training in the 2,040 square-foot facility. This environment is designed to instill leadership, a strong work ethic, discipline, dedication, and determination which will carry over onto and off of the field of play.

The ACHIEVE Center

The Drexel ACHIEVE Center is located on the lower level of the Daskalakis Athletic Center. It is the place on campus where student-athletes can utilize computers, academic coaching, study groups, life skills workshops and much more. "The ACHIEVE," as it is known to the student-athletes, is also a place where student-athletes meet for private advising, tutoring and study halls. The staff is devoted to helping Drexel's student-athletes reach their academic potential and excel both in the classroom and on the playing field.

ABOUT DREXEL UNIVERSITY

History

Founded in 1891 by Philadelphia financier and philanthropist Anthony J. Drexel, The Drexel Institute of Art, Science and Industry became Drexel University in 1970. Today, Drexel is Philadelphia's technological university. It continues to move up the rankings as one of the best national doctoral universities.

Campus

Drexel's 60-acre campus is located within walking distance of Center City Philadelphia. The campus includes 25 academic buildings, eight residence halls and four outdoor recreation fields. Ten fraternity and sorority houses, as well as other off-campus housing, are located adjacent to campus in the historic Powelton Village section of University City. An 18-acre outdoor athletic complex, with two lighted artificial turf fields, nine tennis courts and a softball field, is located just west of Powelton Village. On July 1, 2002, Drexel formally acquired the former MCP Hahnemann University, which now includes the Drexel University College of Medicine, College of Nursing and Health Professions and School of Public Health. Drexel's most recent addition to its campus is the College of Law, which opened its doors in the fall of 2006.

Students

More than 12,000 full-time undergraduates roam Drexel's University City campus. The school's student body in its entirety is comprised of nearly 20,000 total students from 49 states and 118 different countries.

Faculty

The school also has a highly qualified faculty, and with a 10:1 student to faculty instructional ratio students ensured a quality education. Approximately 94 percent of Drexel's full-time faculty members hold a Ph.D. or the highest degree granted in their field of study. Many of the faculty members of Drexel's engineering school are registered professional engineers. Faculty members are engaged in cutting-edge research in subjects ranging from biomedical technology to business methods and educational outreach. These innovators also take the time to teach undergraduate level courses and serve as advisors.

Technology

A leader in curricular and technological innovation, Drexel became the first university to require all students to have microcomputers in 1983. In 2000, Drexel became the first major university to operate a fully wireless campus. In 2002, the University launched Drexel One Mobile, the first wireless Web portal service for students.

Since then Drexel has regularly been recognized as a paragon of technological innovation within the context of higher education.

Several major publications have recognized Drexel as a paragon of technological, scientific and business education.

- *C/O* magazine presented Drexel with 2006 CIO 100 award for being among the nation's top 100 organizations that have distinguished themselves by creating business value through the effective and innovative use of information technology.
- LeBow College of Business's undergraduate business program is 58th in *Business Week's* inaugural rankings of the country's best undergraduate business schools. The College ranks 14th in median salary of graduates, 24th in enrollment, 27th in academic quality, 48th in average SAT score and 15th in cost.
- *The Princeton Review* ranked Drexel among America's "Top 25 Most Connected Campuses" in 2006.
- The Intel Corporation ranked Drexel No. 22 out of 100 in the country on its "Most Unwired College Campuses" survey.
- In March 2006, the *Financial Times* ranked the LeBow College of Business's MBA in pharmaceutical management program as one of the top 25 distance learning programs.
- *Entrepreneur Magazine* ranked the LeBow College of Business entrepreneurial program among the nation's top 25 in entrepreneurial emphasis.



Academic Programs

The University offers 73 bachelor's programs, 41 master's programs, 31 doctoral programs, a doctor of medicine program, a juris doctorate and 13 graduate-level certificate programs. Drexel's colleges include: The College of Arts and Sciences; LeBow College of Business; Drexel University College of Medicine; Engineering; Information Science and Technology; Media Arts & Design; Nursing and Health Professions; The College of Law and Goodwin College of Professional Studies. The schools are: Biomedical Engineering, Science and Health Systems; Education; and Public Health.



Philadelphia

The city of Philadelphia offers Drexel students plenty of places to learn, play, and experience the arts. Philadelphia encompasses Fairmount Park, the largest urban park system in the country; is home to hundreds of neighborhoods, each with its own distinct personality and attractions. There is something for everyone in “The City of Brotherly Love” from the zoo, to the art museum, majestic boathouse row to the city’s passionate sports culture. Drexel students can take advantage of Philadelphia’s many attractions through region-specific courses (often including field trips), a comprehensive transportation network, and Drexel’s campuses, which are all close to the heart of the city. If you do choose to live on campus, you’ll have even more to look forward to with residence hall-sponsored excursions and the daily activities that take you into Philadelphia’s neighborhoods and communities.

Moving Ahead

One of the main reasons for Drexel’s recent innovation and expansion is President Constantine Papadakis, Ph.D., who has been the president of Drexel University since 1995. Since becoming president, Papadakis has seen undergraduate applications, the endowment and co-op employers triple and full-time undergraduate enrollment, research funding, philanthropy, net assets and number of co-op students double.

Alumni

After modest beginnings in 1891, today’s Drexel University boasts more than 90,000 alumni worldwide and is known internationally as one of America’s best technical universities. Some of Drexel’s best-known alumni include: former NASA astronaut Dr. James Bagain (’73); television producer Chuck Barris (’53), creator of “The Newlywed Game” and “The Gong Show;” Robert J. Hall (’67) former publisher of the Philadelphia Inquirer and the Philadelphia Daily News; Hon. Sandra Schultz Newman (’59) Justice of Pennsylvania Supreme Court; Malik Rose (’96) forward for NBA’s New York Knicks; N. Joseph Woodland (’47) inventor of the Universal Product Code (UPC) also known as the “bar code” and ESPN sportscaster Chris McKendry (’90).

Drexel and Beyond...

In 2004, 2,095 students earned bachelor’s degrees. Of these Drexel graduates, 50 percent found gainful employment within six months of graduation and 86 percent of them obtained employment in their field of study. Eight percent are pursuing graduate or professional school.

Drexel Co-Op

One of the trademarks of a Drexel education, since its establishment in 1919, has been the school’s co-operative education program which gives students a chance to work in the “real world” as part of their college education. The only mandatory co-operative education program in Pennsylvania and one of three in the United States, Drexel’s 88-year-old experiential learning program is among the nation’s oldest and largest. More than 4,500 Drexel students are placed with 1,500 employer organizations in the business, government, health care industry and education sectors in 42 states and 20 international locations to fulfill their co-op requirements.

Drexel’s co-op program was ranked among the nation’s top 10 experiential-learning programs by *U.S. News & World Report*.

Student Life

More than 160 student clubs, societies, and organizations bring like-minded people together for social, professional, or service activities. Our thriving fraternities and sororities have active schedules and housing in Powelton Village. The John A. Daskalakis Athletic Center has a fully equipped wellness center, swimming pool, and basketball and squash courts. Varsity sports teams, intramural sports, and club sports provide a multitude of chances to play or cheer on a team. Want to explore things off campus? You’re in luck. Philadelphia, the fifth largest city in the nation, has cultural, entertainment, historical, and recreational opportunities for any taste.

Dragons Shock No. 1 Virginia, 11-10

Drexel kicked off its 2007 season with one of the biggest wins in school history as the Dragons upset Virginia, 11-10, in Charlottesville, Va. Freshman Colin Ambler scored two goals in the last 10 seconds of his first career collegiate game to give Drexel the win. The Cavaliers, the defending national champions, had won 17 straight games and 19 in a row at home. It was the first time in school history that a Drexel team has defeated the top-ranked team in the nation in any sport.

The win catapulted the Dragons into the national spotlight. Drexel was ranked 17th in the Nike/Inside Lacrosse Men’s Division I Media Poll following the game. Goalie Bruce Bickford’s 17 saves against Virginia opened eyes across the country as the junior put together an impressive season that would eventually lead to Bickford being added to the Tewaaraton Award’s Watch List. The Tewaaraton trophy is awarded annually to the most outstanding male varsity collegiate lacrosse player in the United States. Ambler went on to be named the CAA’s Rookie of the Year while Head Coach Chris Bates was named the league’s coach of the year.

ACADEMIC OPPORTUNITIES AT DREXEL

The ACHIEVE Center

The ACHIEVE Center, which stands for Athletes and Coaches Having an Impact on Education, Volunteerism and Employment, is utilized exclusively by student-athletes for academic coaching, study groups, study skills and NCAA CHAMPS Life Skills seminars, Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) and career management workshops. The ACHIEVE Center is one of the premier academic study, advising and assistance programs of its kind. Developed by Dr. Rebecca Gigli in 1997, the Center is in place to help student-athletes manage the rigors of their simultaneous roles as students and athletes. Gigli, who has been nationally recognized for her visionary work, staffs the ACHIEVE Center with dedicated advisors and mentors who are committed to helping student-athletes achieve their full academic potential.



The ACHIEVE Center's goals include the following:

- To facilitate a high retention rate
- To provide quality academic and support services to all student-athletes
- To work effectively in developing partnerships with professional staff and faculty
- To serve as liaisons with the academic community and advocates for student-athletes
- To promote Drexel's athletic reputation and public image through involvement within the local community
- To prepare student-athletes to be adaptable in all aspects of their lives through the delivery of "Life Skills Education"
- To achieve continued academic excellence in the conference
- To assist coaches with the recruitment of student-athletes
- To provide experiential learning opportunities for graduate students

Renovations to the ACHIEVE Center were completed in the summer of 2005, allowing the Center to serve more student-athletes and provide a variety of opportunities for academic enhancement. Since its opening, the ACHIEVE Center has been a hub of academic activity at the Daskalakis Athletic Center. The Center is open more than 60 hours each week including evenings and weekends. Student-athletes refer to the center as "The ACHIEVE" and have made it a place where they like to study, utilize computers and interact with the staff about academic questions and concerns. The renovation has made it possible for more private advising and tutoring to take place while maintaining the general use area for computers and study halls. The ACHIEVE Center will continue to be used as a gathering and instructional space for workshops and meetings to promote and encourage life skills, leadership, personal development, career readiness and community outreach. The quality of Drexel's academic services program is punctuated by this renovation and further evidence that at Drexel, the "student" in student-athlete really does come first.
