

Scarlet Winner 39 to 33

It's getting to be a habit for Pittsburgh teams to scare the daylights out of Ohio State teams.

Pitt's basketballers lifted a page from Wes Fesler's football book Saturday night in the fairgrounds coliseum and barely missed spoiling Tippy Dye's debut as head basketball coach, and the Bucks' game winning streak.

But, as was the case in Ohio Stadium last fall, Ohio State pulled itself together and hid the Panther once again, this time to the tune of 39-33, thereby accomplishing three things:

1. Starting the 1946-47 season with a victory;
2. Extending the record to 22 consecutive home victories, covering the period since February of 1944; and,
3. Presenting Coach Dye with his first success as a Big Nine mentor.

For the first five minutes of the game, Pitt looked discouragingly stubborn. The Panthers, playing a slow, deliberate passing game stood all even with the favored Bucks at 6-6 with five minutes played.

But there the Bucks, led by long Jack Underman, steamed it up to 21-11 at intermission.

Apparently Coach Dr. H. C. Carlson said the right things between halves, because the Pitts proceeded to return to the court and knock the socks off the Bucks. They managed to dunk 10 points in the space of three minutes and 22 seconds to draw even with Ohio State at 21-21 flip-up basket by Forward David doing the knotting.

Nate Apple drove in the basket and meshed hander to give U... 23-21 advantage

With 11 minutes still to play, Dodo Canterna sneaked under the basket again and hit for a 25-22 Pittsburgh margin. But apparently there the Panthers had overstepped their mark, because the Bucks roared back to salt the game away.

Little Jimmy Harris, shortest guy on the squad at 5-feet 9-inches, thumped one in from the side and well out to bring the Bucks up to 24-25 and Huston added the necessary foul shot for a tie with 6:48 to play. He tossed a long one for a 27-25 Ohio State edge with 6:02 to go and that lead stuck. Harris liked the scoring idea so well he flipped in a pass-off try and

drove in for another, following Huston's second free throw.

Freshman Les Pugh, only newcomer in the starting line-up, came to life in the closing minutes for two baskets and a free throw to offset a flurry by David and Boose to Pitt.

Capt. Paul Huston had the honor of scoring the first basket of the season, a long pitch from the side that cleared the hoop and swished the net to give Ohio State a 2-0 lead. Les Pugh's free throw made it 3-0 before Dodo Canterna caged one for the visiting Pitts.

Donham connected on a free throw, but Canterna again hit from the field to give Pitt its first even status. Free throws by Huston and Jack Underman sent the Bucks ahead again, 6-4, but David picked off a rebound at the side of the court and pitched it through for a 6-6 count.

Underman came up under the hoop and lobbed the ball through, then added a bat-in after a fast exchange of the ball and the Bucks were off and running.

Both teams left something to be desired in the way of polish, but it could be overlooked on the basis of its being a first game for each. The Bucks hit 14 of 50 shots and Pitt 13 of 47.

Jack Graf's Ohio State Jay-Vees started the evening with a 42-36 victory over Pitt, after leading 19-17 at the half.

Bucks Lose Two in Row To Huskies

SEATTLE, DEC. 24—(AP)—Ohio State's Buckeyes, defending Big Nine champions and No. 3 collegiate basketball team of 1946, lost their second game in a row last night to the University of Washington Huskies, 52 to 46.

After a dingdong first half in which each team led five times and the score was tied three times, the Huskies pushed ahead in the last four minutes to run up a 26 to 22 lead. This came after both hard-running teams had been held to a 2-2 deadlock at the end of the first five minutes.

In the second half, Washington showed its superiority throughout, never surrendering its lead. There were times when the Ohio Staters crept within two points—at 31-29, 32-30 and 32-34.

It was not until midway of the final period that the battling Buckeyes pulled even at 39—all when Freshman Jim Harris, smallest man on the squad at 5 feet, 9 inches, bucketed one from the side to tie it up. But angular Bill Taylor, Washington guard, immediately responded with an identical side shot and free throw to put Washington ahead at 42-39, and the lead was enhanced when six-foot seven Don Roberts, tipped in a rebound to push it to 44-39 with five minutes left.

Ohio State was charged with the unbelievable total of 30 personal fouls and lost three men, Harris, Huston and Pfeiffer, on five personals.

The Ohio Staters head today for Berkeley and a series with the University of California, Friday and Saturday.

Buck Cagers Bow To Bears, 57-47

BERKELEY, CALIF., DEC. 28—Ohio State had one desperate chance to salvage something from what has been a distasteful West Coast invasion in its finale against the University of California here tonight.

The touring Buckeyes dropped their third straight decision last night to the basket-happy Bruins, 57-47, and were anything but impressive. The Bears led 27-18 at the half and never gave the Western Conference champions a look in after that.

California took the lead at the start of the game and held it for 12 minutes of the first half. The visitors went ahead briefly at that stage on a free throw by center Jack Pfeiffer. Then California pulled away, scoring 15 points before the Buckeyes could count again.

The opening minutes of the contest saw a scoring duel between Ohio State forward Jimmy Harris and Jack Rocker, California forward, both of whom counted nine points in the first 12 minutes.

Rocker paced the winners, totaling 15 points. For Ohio State, guard Warren Amling, star Buckeye football player, bucketed 13 points, followed by Harris with 12 and forward Bob Donham with 11.

Spelled Revenge

The victory, spelled revenge for California, which dropped a game to Ohio State in the NCAA tournament at New York last year.

Coach Tippy Dye is still plagued with his center problem, perhaps more so than ever. His two pivot men, Jack Pfeiffer and Jack Underman, contributed the magnificent total of two points. Pfeiffer, who started, pitched in a pair of free throws. Neither center could hit for a basket and Underman was "shut out" of the scoring column.

The two Buck centers now have a total of 19 points between them for the western swing, which included two defeats at Washington before last night's setback. For the season, Underman and Pfeiffer have 28 points.

Whether he would make some changes or not for tonight's finale, Coach Dye did not indicate. The Buckeye squad is scheduled to leave here on Monday.

The Buckeyes, soundly spanked by defeating the Blue and Gold in last March's N. C. C. A. tournament were never in it after the opening 1 minutes of play. Only the fact that His Nibs swept the bench near clean in the second half softened the blow dealt the Big Nine visitor from Columbus, O.

Some 6500 fans last night didn't know whether to expect the Bears to fold as they did last weekend in the opener against Illinois or to flash the exceptional form they did in the second game against the White Kids.

It proved the latter.

And, in so proving, the Bears indicated their conference rivals—UCLA and Stanford—had better start worrying come Jan. 1 when the playing is for keeps.

Hoosiers Take Bucks, 62-39

Columbus, Ohio (AP) — Indiana handed Ohio State its first basketball defeat in 24 home games by downing the Bucks, Western conference title defenders, 62 to 39 here last night.

The contest got off to a slow start with five minutes elapsing before Indiana's Don Ritter plunked in a fielder. Midway through the first half, Jack Underman of Ohio State tallied.

In the second heat, the Hoosiers held the Bucks scoreless for seven minutes, then doubled the count 40 to 20 halfway through the period.

Faulty shooting proved the Bucks' downfall. They made but 13 field goals out of 71 attempts while Indiana tried 72 times and succeeded with 20 fielders.

Ralph Hamilton led the scorers with 14 while his teammate, Ritter, ran a close second with 13 points. It was the Bucks' first loss at home since bowing to Purdue in 1944 and their first defeat against one victory in Big Nine competition this season. The Hoosiers have played no other Western conference games this season.

Last year's Big Nine Champions, Ohio State, might just as well have been any junior college team last night as the Iowa Hawkeyes hammered out a convincing 61-35 win for their first conference victory of the season against one defeat.

But while the cheers for the Buckeye capitulation were still ringing through the fieldhouse, the Hawks were forced to put aside the win and focus their attention upon the Monday night invasion of Minnesota's Golden Gophers. The Minnesota game will give the Hawks a chance to improve their tied-for-third place position in the Big Nine race.

The Buckeyes presented a team which was built like medium tanks and played like them. In Iowa they hit a team which bore little resemblance to the one which staggered through a bad first half against Wisconsin. The Hawks played an alert, aggressive, and inspired game as they hit the Buckeyes hard in the opening minutes to build up a commanding 40-16 halftime lead which they maintained through a slow second half.

Murray Wier and Herb Wilkinson split scoring honors for Iowa with 14 points apiece while Noble Jorgensen accounted for 13 markers. All of the Hawkeyes turned in stellar games but none showed the sellout crowd of 14,400 more

improvement than 6-9 Jorgensen. The giant Hawk pivot man, battling hard to keep his starting position, teamed with Spencer to completely control the rebounds and turned in a sweet offensive game. His pivot shots were hitting and he was leaving his feet and going high on tip-in efforts.

In fairness to the Buckeyes it should be mentioned that they played the entire game with hard luck on their side. The Bucks simply couldn't hit the basket and their high-point man, Center Jack Pfeiffer, accumulated only nine points.

The Hawks started fast as Jorgensen, who went on to score six points in two minutes, hit on a neat pivot. Wier netted his first long one-handed push shot and Jorgensen obligingly tipped in a missed free throw for two more points. Spencer, the play-maker, hit Wier with a long pass and the Hawks were eight points to the good.

Donham opened the Buckeyes' scoring with a free throw which was offset by another pivot strike by Jorgensen. Donham hit a backhand push but Wier and Wilkinson hit long push shots to give Iowa a 14-3 edge.

Huston cashed in on a chariot toss and that was the extent of the Buckeyes' scoring for six long minutes. Meanwhile, Herb Wilkinson, Magnusson, Wier and Jorgensen got together 12 points, to put Iowa ahead 26-4 with eight minutes played.

The bewildered Ohio State crew finally stopped the rout momentarily as Underman, Huston and Bowen managed three baskets but then the Hawks were off to the races again.

Spencer started the big push with a long set shot and Wier added a free throw to match Campbell's effort before Herb Wilkinson scored on a tip in shot. Huston made a free throw only to have Metcalfe, reserve Hawk center, pull one of the sweetest feints of the night to outfox Underman and score on a short push shot.

Ohio State, trying to make up in roughness what they lacked in finesse, fouled four consecutive times and Herb Wilkinson, Magnusson and Metcalfe added a similar

ilar number of points to Iowa's lead. Underman, scored a free throw and J. Wells and Wier traded baskets to make the intermission score 40-16 with Iowa sporting a 24-point margin and liking it.

Statistically the story reads about the same for the first half for Iowa hit .349 percent fieldgoal attempts to the Buckeyes .200 percent.

The second half was just short of being boring as Iowa continued to pour it on in spite of themselves. The Hawk attack slowed down and they forced the Buckeyes to come out after the ball which left their defense vulnerable to Iowa's fast break thrusts.

The Iowa defense in collaboration with tough luck on Ohio State's part resulted in a basket drought in which the Bucks made only one basket in the first 10 minutes of the half. Magnusson opened the scoring with a long poke and Jorgensen swished a free throw. Bowen matched it for the Bucks but Herb Wilkinson got hot and hit for two baskets and a charity toss to make the margin 48-17.

Wier's free throw concluded the one sided scoring and Ohio State matched Iowa's points the rest of the game. Campbell's free throw and Pfeiffer's set shot equalled another of Wier's baskets and Jorgensen's free throw and so on down the line.

Hawk reserve Charlie Mason broke loose in the last four minutes to hit a set up and then a long set shot which, with Spencer's long one-handed push and Eugene Hall's two free throws, concluded the Hawkeye scoring.

ILLINOIS WHIPS OHIO, 61 TO 42; WILDCATS LOSE

Champaign, Ill., Jan. 13—Ohio State's defending champions in the Big Nine basketball race were able to score only one field goal during the first half of their battle with Illinois tonight and what happened after that didn't matter.

Illinois won, 61 to 42.

It was Illinois' second straight Western conference victory after two losses and indicated that the pre-war Whiz Kids still aren't out of the title running.

Long range shooting by one of them, Jack Smiley, sent the Illini to their 31 to 8 half time lead and started the Buckeyes toward their third straight Big Nine loss—virtually dethroning them.

Ohio Leads, 1-0, and 3-2

Free throws accounted for all the points in the first four minutes as Ohio State led, 1 to 0, then Illinois, 2 to 1, and Ohio again, 3 to 2. Illinois went ahead after three minutes, 4 to 3 and thereafter never was headed.

Smiley hit for five baskets and three free throws as the Illini came with a rush. Whiz Kid Andy Phillip made three goals during the attack which left Ohio trailing by 23 points at the intersection. Ohio's only basket was by Jack Underman, substitute center, after 12 minutes of play.

Underman Shows Old Time Form

Jack Underman, the big dental student from West High, yanked himself out of a season-long slump and carried Ohio State with him to a 60-49 victory over Big Nine cellar-dwelling Northwestern in the Coliseum Saturday night.

The success, attributed chiefly to Underman's sudden scoring burst of 17 points, constituted Big Nine win No. 2 for the Buckeyes and No. 3 for 10 starts all season, while the Wildcats suffered their fourth straight league defeat and their sixth in 10.

Underman flipped through eight field goals for by far his best point performance of the campaign—he had 29 points up to here in nine games—and played an exceptionally strong floor game. His rebounding and pivot work added immeasurably to the Buck's victory, though the all-around basketball by both teams wasn't sensational, by any means.

Northwestern led only once during the whole sad affair and managed to be even three times. During two intervals of more than five minutes in the first half the Wildcats failed to connect for a single basket. They wound up the period behind 30-18 and with but six fielders—as opposed to the Buck's 15.

The Buckeyes didn't hit a free throw in the first period and, in fact, not until 15 minutes and 57 seconds of the last half had elapsed. Razor Campbell finally notched one after nine straight misses from the free throw line.

From the field, however, the Bucks showed some improvement, which should be included in the reasons why the tide of battle turned toward Tippy Dye's young men. They hit 28 of 95 shots for a .295 average (They've been stumbling along at about a .180 clip), while Northwestern's hot-shots were taking 82 throws and hitting 18 for a .220 average.

For sheer marksmanship, however, the laurel wreath went to Chester Strumillo, Northwestern guard, who dunked six of seven pitches at the net, five from far out on the court. He finished with 13 points, playing only part of the last half. Bobby Bowen of the Bucks hit four of five in the first half and another in the last for a 10-point performance.

Underman, incidentally, got 13 of his 17 in the last half, in which Northwestern rallied to cut down the Bucks one-time 17-point lead to seven points at the narrowest margin, five minutes before the end of the game.

The Bucks go to Pittsburgh Monday night.

Whiz Kids Rally For 59-58 Win

Ohio State "unfroze" its shooting assets Saturday night, but Illinois' dazzling "Whiz Kids" had the right answers. They edged by the Bucks, 59-58, in a sensational contest that had the 7307 Coliseum customers exhausted.

Miserably "cold" on its shooting all season, Ohio State uncorked an amazing effort in pocketing 24 of 56 shots for just under a .500 average. Any coach will settle for a .333 average.

Warren Amling, Buckeye guard, had the most sensational night of his illustrious career with the basket, caging seven of 11 shots, while Center Jack Underman pitched in nine of 18.

Altogether, the Bucks played by far their finest game of the season, a brand of ball expected of them all along. But it just wasn't enough for the "Whiz Kids," about the sweetest, classiest, smartest foursome any coach could dream about.

The "Kids" had a tough night with the percentages, hitting only 22 of 79 shots. Only nine of 42 were made in a very poor first half. They weren't so lax from the free-throw line, however. The last five Illini points came from the charity line, without a miss.

The Bucks grabbed the lead at 8-6 in the first five minutes and never relinquished the edge until nine minutes and 37 seconds before the end of the game, when the Illini forged ahead, 42-41. The Buckeyes had led 28-22 at half-time and, thanks to four baskets in five shots in the first three minutes and three seconds of the second, once held a margin at 36-24.

Guard Gene Vance, a truly great basketball player, threw in nine straight points in the span of two minutes and 13 seconds to haul the Illini from a 33-41 to a 40-41 deficit. Jack Smiley tossed in the bucket that put Illinois ahead.

but the Bucks weren't ready to roll over and play dead. Amling, whose sensational driving, overhand southpaw shots hand set the crowd wild, hit another and Ohio led again, 43-42. Phillip pitched in a short, quick one for Illinois to regain the lead, but Underman hit another of his deadly overhand hook shots to boost it to 45-44 and Amling added a free throw to give the Bucks a three-point bulge with 6:23 to play.

Then came that Phillip fellow, who's all they've said about him. He meshed three in the space of three minutes and Illinois had a 50-46 lead it never relinquished. The Bucks made it hectic to the very finish, pulling up to 52-50 at the 4:52 mark on baskets by Underman and Huston, falling back to 55-50 when Menke found the range, but Huston and Amling kept 'em in there at 56-58 a minute and a quarter before the end. Smiley's free throw with 44 seconds to go was the ultimate margin when Underman overhanded his ninth of the evening to pull up to 59-59 with 23 seconds to go.

Maybe the pay-off shot of all, however, was Jack Smiley's desperation heave from exactly the mid-floor stripe with two seconds of the first half remaining. It was one of those usual one-in-a-million tries, but this one looped in without touching the hoop.

The win was Illinois' fourth in six Big Nine starts, its tenth in 14 starts for the season, the defeat Ohio's fourth conference loss in six tries, its tenth defeat in 13 games for the season.

Those bedraggled basketball forces of Ohio State broke out in a scoring rash last night and walked Purdue, 75 to 61, for their fourth victory in '35 starts this season.

The setback just about sounded the death knell for the Boiler-makers' Western Conference championship hopes as it was their fourth defeat in seven league tests. Funeral services for the Ohio State chances have already been held.

COLISEUM RECORD SET

A crowd of 4469 saw the two teams establish a Fairgrounds Coliseum scoring record for a single game by pouring the grand total of 136 points through the nets in the 40 minutes of rough-and-tough action. Ohio State's aggregate of 75 points is a season high for the Bucks.

The game wasn't exactly a perfect example of how the popular winter sport should be played and the two officials added to the weirdness of the occasion with a number of hard-to-understand decisions.

ALL BUCKS SCORE WELL

With Bobby Bowen and Jack Underman lighting the way, Ohio State hurled 29 field goals through the draperies. Bowen, set shot specialist, and Underman, from the pivot position, each meshed eight baskets but two free throw by Bowen gave him a total of 18 points and high scoring honors among the Bucks.

Each and every one of the Ohio starters collected at least 11 points. Capt. Paul Huston caged 12 and Warren Amling and Bob Donham 11 apiece.

Huston and Amling experienced quite an evening of it, their chief headache being the rugged Purdue captain, Paul Hoffman, who wound up the merry festivities with a total of 21 points for top point laurels. Hoffman, now in his fourth and final year as a Purdue regular, plays the game as though he had been born with a basketball in each hand.

The big fellow was aided and abetted by an accomplice, Myrwin (Red) Anderson, midget forward who is faster than the show at the Gayety. For reasons best known to Coach Mel Taube, Anderson, who scored 21 points against Northwestern Saturday night, didn't enter the contest until the first half was almost 10 minutes old. From that time on Messrs. Hoffman and Anderson provided more fireworks than Christmas-time in Tennessee. Little Andy pocketed a total of 15 points.

BUCKS ALWAYS IN LEAD

Actually, if it hadn't been for the antics of Hoffman and Anderson—and the endeavors of Huston and Amling to stop them—the game itself might have been duller than last month's newspaper.

Ohio took the lead in the first 10 seconds when Bowen stripped his first set shot. The Bucks then proceeded to pile up a comfortable lead. Although always trailing, the Boiler-makers made several threatening gestures. At half-time, the scoreboard read: Ohio State, 39; Purdue, 27. Capt. Huston left the game with only 23 seconds to play, a victim of the five personal foul route.

The Buck offense, in its brightest display of the season, clicked at a 354 pace, getting its 23 fielders on 82 shots. Purdue dropped in 23 out of 92 opportunities for an even 25 per cent. From the charity line, Ohio State made 17 of 24; Purdue 15 of 25.

BUCK RESERVES WIN

Still without their first road victory of the season, the Bucks will try again Saturday night against Michigan State at East Lansing. Only remaining home game is with Michigan Mar. 3.

In the curtain-raiser last night, the Ohio State junior varsity wrote its ninth straight triumph into the record books, outscoring the Purdue "Bees," 54 to 50. The Buck "stars of the future" are undefeated.

Bucks Rally In Last Half, Win, 58 to 46

OSU Beats Spartans; Bowen Gets 21 Points

EAST LANSING, MICH., Feb. 15.—(U.P.)—Ohio State's basketball team pulled away in the second half to defeat Michigan State College, 58 to 46, before 5800 fans here tonight.

The game was close throughout the first half with the score tied five times and the lead changing hands six times.

Bucks Edge Wisconsin, 57 to 56

Ohio State Stops Big Nine Leaders

MADISON, WIS., Feb. 22.—An underdog Ohio State basketball team fought from behind in the second half tonight to clip Wisconsin's Western Conference pacesetters, 57 to 56, in a rough, see-saw battle before 14,000 fans.

The loss was the second in the Big Nine for the Badgers, who needed a victory to clinch a share of conference title. It was Ohio State's fourth win against five defeats.

The Buckeyes won the hard way. They trailed, 36-27, at the half, but their second period drive left the Badgers shaken.

Bowen Ices Game

The lead changed hands 19 times as both teams fought savagely to hold an advantage, and the issue wasn't settled until Forward Bob Bowen canned a free throw with 27 seconds left and broke a 56-all deadlock.

Ohio State took the lead with five minutes left as Forward Bob Donham dropped in a field goal and a free throw to give the Bucks a 51-50 advantage. They increased to a 56-52 lead with 30 seconds remaining but Wisconsin came back behind Bob Cook, Ed Mills and Exner Menzel to tie the count.

Underman Gets 18

Menzel missed a second free throw which would have given Wisconsin the lead and set the margin for Bowen's dramatic payoff shot.

Wisconsin's tight defense forced Ohio State to shoot from far out and drive on rebounds. Center Jack Underman was the top Buckeye scorer with 18 points, and his second half work under the basket meant the victory. Warren Amling's sensational long shots in the first half kept the visitors within striking distance.

The score changed hands 13 times during the first half. The Bucks last held the lead in that half at 20-19. At that stage, Menzel's fielder put the Badgers in front and they ran it to 32-27 by the halftime intermission. Twice the Badgers' lead was only one point, 26-25, and 28-27.

Jack Underman Leads OSU 5 Over Wildcats

Bucks Run Up 62-42 Score at Chicago

CHICAGO, March 1.—Driving hard throughout the game and shooting with remarkable accuracy, Ohio State's Buckeyes outplayed the Northwestern Wildcats to run up a 62-42 score in the Chicago Stadium here last night before 10,007 fans.

Jack Underman, by scoring 17 points on seven baskets and a trio of free throws, increased his season's conference record to 131 points, giving him sixth position among the conference point-getters.

The Wildcats attack, pathetic in the first half, was led by Chuck Tourek, a guard, with 14 points. Warren Amling, Ohio Guard, duplicated this total and now has 93 conference points.

Northwestern led for 15 seconds, but after that the game developed into a runaway as the Buckeyes connected on almost every spot they tried in the first half-dozen minutes.

Cats Collapse

Northwestern defense fell apart under the barrage of Buckeye baskets, while the Wildcats' shooting was so inaccurate that they scored only four baskets in the first half.

Northwestern's only consolation came at the free-throw line, where the Wildcats made 10 of 12 attempts. Ohio State's free-throw percentage was no match for their basket shooting, only eight of 17 finding the hoop.

Ben Schadler opened the scoring by intercepting a Buckeye pass and looping in a one-hand push shot. Ohio State took an 8-2 lead as Paul Huston and Amling connected on long shots, and Bob Bowen and Underman pivoted for under-the-basket goals. Again Amling pushed in a one-hander, followed by another pivot by Underman. After five minutes Ohio had a 12-2 advantage.

Take 16-6 Lead

At the 10-minute mark the Buckeyes, playing careful basketball, owned a 16-6 margin. Northwestern had tallied only two baskets, Schadler's game-opening goal and a long one-hander from the right corner by Tourek, with a pair of free throws.

Scoring was slow in the next five minutes, though Underman contributed another pivot and Amling a driving one-hander. After 15 minutes Ohio's lead was 20-8, George Felt having chalked up the third Wildcat basket. At half-time the count was 30-13, as Bob Donham four times slipped through his guard for easy shots.

Twice in succession Amling dribbled to a point just beyond the free-throw zone to flip in push shots, though Tourek then duplicated his performance, with a pair of looping one-handers from well out to the right. Ohio's lead grew to 39-19 in five minutes of the second half, Bowen and Underman contributing.

Jim Wells, Ohio's first sub, replaced Bowen.

Brief Rally

The Wildcats suddenly found the range and narrowed the gap to 44-28 as the clock showed 10 minutes to play. Tourek's three long baskets and another by Schadler made up this offensive drive.

Then the Buckeyes, with Bowen back in, started driving and five minutes before the final gun had a 22-point margin at 56-34. With all regulars except Paul Huston on the bench, the replacements kept pace with a parade of Wildcat subs in the closing minutes.

Ohio State Defeated In Final 16 Seconds

Suprunowicz Sparks Michigan To Hard-Earned 66-62 Victory

Successive baskets by Bill Roberts and Mack Suprunowicz with only 16 seconds to play sealed the doom of a luckless Ohio State cage team last night at the Fairgrounds Coliseum, giving Michigan a 66-62 victory over the Bucks in the final game of the season for both teams.

Just before Roberts' fielder, Center Jack Underman tied the score at 62-62 with a lay-out shot. An overtime period seemed inevitable. But Roberts then found the range on a one-handed push effort. In less time than it takes to tell it, Suprunowicz intercepted a pass on the out-of-bounds play that followed and he, too, dropped the ball through the draperies for insurance, which wasn't needed.

Although the two clubs were battling for only fifth position in the Big Nine standing, they played as though the championship depended on the outcome. The crowd of 5235 frequently didn't concur with the decision of the two officials—but, as usual, lusty boos netted nothing.

SUPRUNOWICZ GETS 25

Main cog in the Michigan machine was Suprunowicz, a clever ambidexterous fellow who can do more things with a basketball than a magician. The Wolverine freshman poured in 25 points, all but three coming in the second half. Boyd McCaslin, substitute forward for Michigan, hit for a total of 15 and Capt. Pete Elliott caged 10.

Underman, whose late-season play may earn him all-league honors again, paced the Ohio State scorers with 24 points, followed by Bob Donham with 19.

Once more Ohio State lost a game from the free throw line. The Bucks outscored Michigan from the floor, 25 to 25, but could convert only 10 of 21 charity opportunities, Underman missing five of seven. Michigan cashed in on 15 of its 20 free throw chances.

WOLVES LEAD AT HALF

Ironically, the great competitor, Warren Amling, completed his career on the Ohio State bench. He was a victim of the five personal foul rule, as was Bob Harrison, Michigan guard.
